INTRODUCTION

"A coast of golden dreams and deep, dark secrets..."



Welcome to Eldorado: a coast of golden dreams and deep, dark secrets; a world of hedonism, hope and heartbreak — and the sun-drenched setting for BBC-1's new three times a week drama serial.

Created by Tony Holland from an idea by John Dark and Verity Lambert, and produced by Julia Smith, *Eldorado* follows the fortunes of a community of ex-patriates living in southern Spain.

The production, being made for the BBC by leading independent Cinema Verity, is one of the most ambitious in British television history. *Eldorado* is shot entirely on location in Spain, centred on a spectacular 25-acre production village which has been specially built in the rugged mountains above Malaga, near the town of Coin.

Its residents have come to the very edge of Europe from all four corners of the Continent. A multi-lingual melting pot of Brits and Spaniards, Scandinavians, Germans and French, they are divided by culture and united by a common pursuit — the search for a new life in the sunshine Shangri-La that is Eldorado.

Their motives for moving here are as diverse as the accents they speak in. For some *Eldorado* simply offers relief and a future far from the greyness of home. For others it is a refuge, a community living for the present, and caring little about the past.

Together they all face the same question. Can life here live up to the fabled promise of the Spanish City of Gold? Or will their dreams wither and die in the searing Spanish heat?



For the creators of *Eldorado*, the challenge of charting these lives is the most exciting they have yet faced — not least because those lives so eloquently mirror their own ambitions under the Andalucian sun.

Along with the cast and largely British crew, Julia Smith and Tony Holland have themselves become virtual exiles from England. They too are pursuing a dream.

"This series is about people who have been brave enough to uproot themselves. They have got up and done something for themselves, as we have with this programme," explains Smith, winner of the coveted Desmond Davis award for outstanding contribution to popular drama at the 1988 BAFTAS.

"We too have a dream and we have come down here to make that dream come true," she adds.

Glamorous locations and ground-breaking new approaches to shooting have been combined to create a series unlike anything so far seen on British television. And the series will move at a pace in keeping with the climate and culture of Spain.



"I want people back in Britain to feel the wind through their hair. It will also move at a much gentler pace than we are used to. Life is not frenetic out here and the programme will reflect that."

"It is going to have a totally different look. I think at this time when England is very grey and sad and tired what I want to do is take TV technically forward and at the same time give people blue skies, brown bodies, greenery, wind and sea. This is going to be something that is a pleasure to look at," she says.

For Tony Holland, the essence of *Eldorado* is escapism of another kind.

"Everybody has a secret, and everybody is running away from something," he says of the 30-strong cast of characters that will inhabit Eldorado.

"They are all trying to find this mythical world, the question is 'does it exist?'," adds the writer, who immersed himself in the real life communities of the Costa del Sol in his search for authenticity.

His storylines will reflect the hedonistic realities of the lifestyles he discovered. Eldorado's days and nights will be devoted

to sun, sand, sangria - and, of course, sex.

"If you are an ex-pat, living here is about filling time. You can fill it by joining Conservatives Abroad, by joining the poetry society, with amateur dramatics or alcohol," he says.

"1992 is the year of Spain and the year of Europe, and the British are not the only people here. We have been true to that and we have characters from different European countries," explains Julia Smith.

"The characters are from different cultures and different classes, it is a wonderful combination of strange bedfellows," she adds.

Along with Smith, Holland, Verity Lambert, head of Cinema Verity, her co-producers John Dark and James Todesco, and line producer David Shanks, those strange bedfellows have been drawn to the Costa del Sol by a remarkable vision.

And now, on the coast of dreams, they are bringing that vision to vivid life — as the citizens of Eldorado



The duo have brought together a pan-European cast, from six countries. Established names well known to British viewers have been blended with complete newcomers from as far afield as Copenhagen, Paris and Barcelona.





FLIGHT INTO THE UNKNOWN

"The truth is that we just didn't know what was going to happen"



As they filed along the aisles of Iberia's Viva Air flight FVI63 to Malaga on 23 April 1992, few passengers paid any attention to the tight-knit group gathered at the front of the plane.

If they had they would have seen on the faces of the cosmopolitan collection — among them a stunning Manchester model, a coolly beautiful Swedish actress, a dashingly handsome Spaniard and a sprinkling of respected British screen and stage stars — a melting pot of emotions.

And as the aircraft climbed into the steely, grey skies they would have seen those expressions transformed into a poignant blend of laughter and tears.

For each and every one of them, this was a Flight Into The Unknown. The cast of the BBC's new £10 million "super-soap" Eldorado will never make such a journey again.

The next time they board a plane every step will be greeted with a nudge, a wink and a wave of an autograph book. And when they next touch down in Britain, they will all be household names.

By then millions will have watched them in a show that is designed to send a citrus-scented breeze through the nation's living rooms.

Julia Smith and Tony Holland — the most successful team in TV soap — created EastEnders and revolutionised broadcasting with its irresistible mix of home-spun, East London reality and controversial story-lines.

Now the same duo are turning television on its head once more with a three times a week cocktail of sun, sea, sangria and sex.

The cast members of *Eldorado* have descended on the sun-drenched Costa del Sol coastline in Southern Spain. It is there, on the most ambitious TV set ever built, high in the mountains near the remote market town of Coin, that they have been recording the BBC's biggest-ever drama project. And it is there that those who become the stars of the show may be making their homes for years to come.



"Excitement at being part of TV history...sadness at leaving family and friends"

For some of the 30 regular cast members the journey to the spectacular Eldorado set — a vast reconstruction of an entire Spanish village among 25-acres of pungent pine forest — was a short one. A handful of the cast already have their homes on the Costa del Sol. For others it was a marathon trek by land, sea and air from cities as far-flung as London, Paris and Copenhagen.

But as those who made the two-and-a-half hour flight from London confirmed, no matter how they made their way to a land many had never seen before, the feelings were similar.



For more than 750,000 each year it is the destination for a fortnight-long escape from the mundane routine of everyday life. But for around 250,000 it is a permanent refuge.

For some of the cast, it must seem like a dream. Kathy Pitkin, not yet 17, was sworn to secrecy when she was given one of the most important roles in the serial. Already poised to become one of the most successful young models in Britain, she was snapped up by producer Julia Smith to become the show's sexiest star, Fizz.

"It will take a long time to sink in. I couldn't believe it when they told me

that I had got the job," said the brunette beauty who travelled down to Spain with her father Terry, a theatre stage manager from Manchester. "It is an incredible opportunity, but I will miss my friends and family," she added.

Pitkin is one of a string of complete unknowns chosen by the producers. Others include Darren Newton and Jon Morrey, two young actors from the North East who run a beach bar, and stunning Spanish actress Sandra Sandri, who plays Pilar Moreno, destined to fall in love with the highly dubious Marcus Tandy.



Excitement at being part of TV history, the thrill of a well-paid job in the sun, but the sadness of leaving families and friends at home — months of separation that would test even the strongest of relationships.

"There were a lot of tears shed," remembered Campbell Morrison, who plays father-of-two Drew Lockhead. "It was the beginning of a journey into the unknown for all of us. The truth is that we just didn't know what was going to happen. We still don't know how the show will be received and how long we will be in Spain."

The producer-writer team has laced the cast with some familiar faces from TV and film. Handsome Wish You Were Here and Rides actor Jesse Birdsall portrays the programme's most roguish character, Marcus Tandy—a heart-breaker. Porridge star Patricia Brake, Buki Armstrong from South of the Border and Black Beauty veteran William Lucas are among the other established screen faces that figure in Eldorado.

become their workplace. As they picked their way through cement mixers, diggers and pile-drivers, Ducados-smoking builders grinned at the actors for whom all their hard work had been intended.

And even though, when they arrived in April, the air was thick with smoke and dust, oil-barrels filled what should have been their drives and paint was still



There is also a sprinkling of stars from the continent. French actors Daniel Lombart and Framboise Gommendy play a sophisticated Parisian couple, while Danish actors Kim Romer and Nanna Moller fly the flag for Scandinavian talent along with Swedish blonde, Bo Corre, who plays tempting tour-guide Ingrid.

In the space of just five months a remote mountainside, previously only known to locals as La Montana del Viento — The Mountain of the Wind — has been transformed into a sprawling Spanish village, now dubbed by locals El Milagro — The Miracle.

Two hundred workmen from the nearby village of Coin have toiled around the clock since January to build a complex of white-washed apartments and villas complete with swimming pool, a two-storey shopping plaza, petrol station, theatre, police station, restaurant, and an old-style Spanish village with a church which dominates the town square.

There, on 24 April, Julia Smith and executive producer Verity Lambert gave the cast their first guided tour of the remarkable creation that will

splattered over their patio windows, everyone admitted to being overwhelmed at the sight that greeted them.

"It's amazing, isn't it," said Jesse Birdsall, as he pored over the plans and looked down on the scene. "You just have to admire the bravery of it all."

The words were dropped casually into the conversation, but their effect was explosive.

"Someone said very casually one day that the new serial would be going out three times a week rather than twice. Tony Holland and I just said 'forget it then, we don't want to know, we are resigning'," remembers Julia Smith.

Since they had first become involved with Eldorado, Julia and her creative partner Tony Holland

had been concentrating on a bi-weekly soap. "When they told us that they wanted half as much again our involved in the development of a major serial of its kind again. Yet here they are tackling an even more demanding task.

"After I left EastEnders, I didn't think I would ever consider getting tangled up in something like this again. But this was too big to miss, too big a challenge not to be involved in," says Julia.

The duo were approached by Cinema Verity after the BBC had asked the independent company for a new, early evening serial to complement EastEnders.

When it was agreed to go ahead with the idea of a soap set amongst the ex-pats of Spain, Julia and Tony Holland began combing the Costas for a community with the right ingredients. Holland

> eventually found such a community at a development called Calahonda, just outside Fuengirola on the Costa del Sol

The community of Eldorado reflects life as it is lived on such an urbanization. "There are people of all ages and all classes. It really is a crazy

melting pot, you can have well-off people from the prosperous south east living next door to a couple of lads from Hull who have no money and an Anglo-Scottish family who are bringing their family up in Spain," she said.

"And as well as having people from different parts of the British Isles you have the strong European element as well," enthuses Julia.

"They are following their dreams, but for some the dreams have already turned into a nightmare and they have instead found themselves trapped, unable to get back to their own country," she adds.

Julia was determined that the serial should have a strong European flavour and has recruited cast members from all over the Continent.

"They will speak their own languages when appropriate, just like when they are at home, and there will be no sub-titling," she said.

initial reaction was that it was not possible," she explains.

After that first rush of blood, however, Julia took a fresh view — and began looking at three shows a week as

a challenge rather than a threat.

"I started thinking about how we would do a show that we would not be ashamed of and that would allow us to be innovative," she says.

She struck on the idea of using two teams of directors and allowing each team a fortnight rather than a week to film episodes. "That way directors would have more time to think and we could also maintain the standards and use the types of locations and shooting styles that we wanted," she says.

After their triumph in creating the phenomenally successful EastEnders for BBC Television, both Smith and Holland doubted whether they would ever become

Since she first established herself as one of the leading creative forces within British television more than 30 years ago, Julia has consistently set new standards.

She first worked with Tony Holland back in the mid-60s on *Z* Cars. Since then they have created such successes as *Angels* and *District Nurse*.

She believes their partnership works because they are at once alike and unalike each other. "In many ways we are totally different, I am probably more practical and he is more Quixotic. But we both have mercurial minds and we both have the ability to think on our feet, which is something we will have to do on Eldorado.


"We also have total faith in each other and total trust in each other. I think that more than anything makes it work," she adds.

Julia admits that creating Eldorado has been a physically punishing process. "There is an absolute degree of stamina needed. I gave up four years of my life for EastEnders and swore I would never do it again. Yet here I am again," she says.

"I don't see Eldorado as my swansong. It is simply the latest challenge that I have accepted. I don't think I will ever be able to resist a challenge," she says.

TONY HOLLAND

Creator and Storyliner

Calahonda - "my favourite place in the world"

The supermarket and cafe-bar in the shopping complex at Calahonda on the Costa del Sol is Tony Holland's "favourite place in the world" and is the inspiration for the Eldorado shopping plaza.

It was after finding the complex that firm ideas for a drama serial set in Spain sprang to life. Before that, Tony had been shown picture postcard villages and prim and proper new urbanizations - that Riviera touch. There wasn't a serial in those places and he

> told Verity Lambert and Iulia Smith that it was "all off".

"I had the shopping plaza, the bar, and when I looked over the balcony behind, there was the urbanization." Tony used his favourite square in the old town of Fuengirola as the model for Los Barcos the remains of the fishing village, now the old town, in Eldorado.

Tony said that part of his inspiration had originally come from a visit to Marjorca. "I was there three years ago and I found this area, and thought 'My God, this is the world encapsulated in five square feet'. It was marvellous - every nationality was there, the North-South divide, the lot.

"I stored it in the back

He gave her five pages of script called 'Little England'. It was then that he started his search in

Spain, and eventually found Calahonda. "The characters have been buzzing around in my head for a year. They make up the history of Britain over the past 70 years, and then there are also the French, Spanish, Danes, Swedes and Germans."

of my head." Then about a year ago, he got a call from Verity Lambert. Among other ideas for a serial, she suggested one set in Spain.

"We sat in the cafe-bar and watched all the nationalities pass by "




'Stop!'. It was Calahonda — and I knew this was it."

They stopped, sat in the cafe-bar by the checkout points of the supermarket, and watched the life of the ex-pat Brits and other nationalities pass by. Upstairs in the complex, he discovered the Dickens pub which inspired Joy's bar in Eldorado.

"The Dickens pub was run by a Glaswegian. We got talking and eventually I plucked up the courage to ask him why he had come to the South of Spain. He told me 'Isn't it everyone's dream to open a bar on the Costa del Sol?' and I thought - you've got a series here.

As the co-creator of EastEnders, he fears that comparisons will be drawn with other TV serials. But this show is totally different to anything else. "You can't draw comparisons" — you can't say, is Joy's bar the new Queen Vic or Rovers Return — is Joy the new Bet Lynch or Angie — who is the new Dirty Den?

"There's no main meeting place like the Queen Vic because the weather is so good most of the time you can meet anywhere — in the street, in the shopping plaza, Joy's bar, the beach bar or the bar in the old town."

Julia and Tony teamed up for the first time on Z Cars and met again when she was asked to take over Angels, re-vamp the programme and turn it into a twice-weekly serial. Their association continued when Julia moved on to District Nurse. They teamed up again when Jonathan Powell asked them to make a new twice-weekly serial for BBCtv — and they refused. "We were still talking and Jonathan casually mentioned 'what about that bend in the River Thames?". EastEnders was born."

Four years ago Verity Lambert and her coexecutive producer John Dark dreamt up an idea for an international drama series set on Spain's Costa del Sol, a setting that already boasted a cosmopolitan community including a large number of ex-patriate Brits.

The idea for a drama based in Europe came, and was then tucked away as her company, Cinema Verity, concentrated on other projects - until the BBC

> announced that it was and would commissioning show

setting up its biggestever outside production independent company to make a popular drama programme to replace Terry Wogan's three times a week chat

"Time was the great enemy," said Verity. "By chance, John Dark and his partner James Todesco had been having discussions in Spain about setting up a film studio complex in the mountains behind Fuengirola on the Costa del Sol.

"At the time we were faced with two possibilities - either to move into a partly-built development on the coast, or create an entire production village of our own. It worked out to be less expensive and more practical to start from scratch. So John and James' studio plans became our Eldorado."

"We got the construction work under way and then we had to find a cast of more than 30 from throughout Europe. We managed that in just ten weeks. We were breaking new ground - producing another "first" for television. It has been a massive undertaking."

Verity Lambert's career has encompassed enduring drama series such as Rock Follies, Minder,

> Flame Trees of Thika, Rumpole of the Bailey, Widows, Reilly - Ace of Spies and Edward and Mrs Simpson. director of productions at Thorn EMI she was responsible for the films Morons From Outer Space, Restless Natives, Dreamchild and Clockwise.

> She founded her own company, Cinema Verity, in 1985 and produced the film

A Cry In The Dark, starring Meryl Streep and Sam Neill. Among the television series her company has made are four series of the situation comedy May to December for BBC-tv, Coasting (Granada), the award-winning Alan Bleasdale drama GBH (Channel 4), Sleepers (BBC-tv) and two series of The Boys From The Bush (BBC-tv).

Verity Lambert went to top drama

serial team Julia Smith and Tony Holland with her idea. The concept for a new serial with an international cast was put forward to the BBC, and Tony Holland provided a "bible" - the industry term for a full synopsis of plots, characters and locations. Julia Smith's experience was used to determine how such a massive project could be mounted. By Christmas 1991, Cinema Verity had won the biggestever commission for an independent producer.

But having won, Verity found herself with a formidable challenge: produce a thrice-weekly programme on the Costa del Sol, and have it up and running for transmission in the summer of 1992.

The town of Coin, high in the mountains above Fuengirola, was suffering 65% unemployment until the BBC threw it a lifeline and built Eldorado in a nearby pine forest, creating a new economy for the area.

That happened because John Dark and James Todesco had a dream to build a studio complex on a steep hillside near Coin, and the BBC needed a Spanish location for its new drama serial.

They formed a partnership with Cinema Verity,

which had won the independent contract from the BBC to make the new serial and, as a result, injected new life and new money into the town of Coin. Built in just five months, the Eldorado village has earned the name El Milagro from the local population - which means, The Miracle.

Talking about the partnership with Cinema Verity, John Dark said, "Four years ago I went to see Verity Lambert at Elstree studios. I didn't know much about television because I make films. But I said to her I thought there was a great television series to be made about the Costa del Sol. With 1992 in view, it was a mirror of the future.

"Then I met my future partner James Todesco who had an agreement to licence 250 acres of land near Coin. At the same time Verity talked to me about putting up a series idea about the Costa del Sol to the BBC."

They met up with Julia Smith and Tony Holland and started searching for a location in the south of Spain. "There were plenty of half finished possibilities - left incomplete by the recession. Then we went to see the land near Coin and it was agreed that we should build the set and facilities ourselves," said John, who has lived in the area for nearly eight years.

John and James had a small studio in nearby Mijas and work started as soon as production designer Keith Harris came on board.

"We got some flak from one British newspaper which thought we were not looking after the ecology, but in fact we went to great lengths to make sure we did nothing wrong. The Spanish have very tough ecology laws.

"We used all local labour - they are tough, talented and they are grafters. As they kept telling us - 'we are doing this for our children's future'."

Verity Lambert's Cinema Verity and John Dark and James Todesco's JD&T are equal production partners in Eldorado. "Verity is the British side and we are the Spanish side," said John. Partner James Todesco had nothing but praise for the BBC's role in commissioning the new serial and being "gutsy" enough to make the drama in the south of Spain.

"By its decision, the BBC has given Coin a huge injection of life. It has boosted the economy and provided employment. It is a very welcome invasion."

When building started, there was no water on the site and there could have been problems about the village being a fire risk. But one day James was out in the woods with the local contractor, Jose Tomas Sanchez, who is no mean hand at water divining. "Suddenly he said he felt there could be water nearby and he picked up a twig. He gave it to me and nothing happened - but when he held it, the thing went crazy.

"I thought no more about it because we weren't going to drill on the land. Then I got a phone call from Jose saying he'd drilled a bore hole. I thought, 'Oh no!' and then he added that they had found a huge underground lake with the purest water ever found in these parts. We couldn't believe it - water is supposed to run down hills, not stay in them! But it solved all our problems and the find seemed like a go-ahead for Eldorado from above.

One of the few British independent film producers, John Dark has a film pedigree which goes back many years. Among his numerous film credits are Half A Sixpence, There's A Girl In My Soup, The Land That Time Forgot, Shirley Valentine starring Pauline Collins and Stepping Out with Liza Minnelli.

DAVID SHANKS

LINE PRODUCER

"I had no hesitation in accepting an offer to be part of the team "

David Shanks has learnt every aspect of television, from his professional beginnings as a floor manager to running his own production company.

His involvement with Eldorado as line producer, began with a 'phone call from Julia Smith. "I'd barely stepped off the plane from Australia where I'd been filming Boys From The Bush, when I was contacted by Julia Smith about the Eldorado project," said David. "I was so infected by her enthusiasm that

I had no hesitation in accepting an offer to be part of the team."


Educated London, David joined the BBC in 1972 but has been self-employed since 1978. He cut his teeth working as a floor manager and first assistant director in current affairs, light entertainment, drama and sport. He first worked with Verity Lambert when he was Location Manager on enormously successful Minder.

David shifted into production management where his credits include Worzel Gummidge, Woman of Substance and, for Humphrey Barclay, Relative Strangers and Never Say Die.

David has a strong track record in comedy. As associate producer for Humphrey Barclay, he worked on the situation comedies Surgical Spirit and Desmonds, as well as Behaving Badly. Other sitcom credits include Stone Age, Des Res and Ten Glorious Years, a satirical resume of ten years of Maggie Thatcher.

He also has a flair for opera, acting as associate producer on Limehouse Production's Rape of Lucretia and as producer when his own company filmed Placido Domingo in *Il Trovatore* at the Royal Opera House for network transmission.

His recent association with Cinema Verity started with budgeting various situation comedies (including May To December which is now in its fourth series) and then setting up and acting as production supervisor on the drama series Coasting.

"We took eight months to complete Albert Square, and five months for Eldorado"


The Eldorado village was brought to life by Keith Harris, the man who created Albert Square for EastEnders. Building Eldorado was a far greater challenge because, as Keith put it, time was the great enemy. "We took eight months to build Albert Square at Elstree and that was mostly batten and hardboard, plus the inside studio sets. With Eldorado we were set incredible deadlines. It still baffles me how we did it. Luckily there were no real problems — if there had been, the village wouldn't be here today."

Keith's task was enormous. Clear part of a hillside pine forest near the town of Coin, in the mountains above Fuengirola, and build a Spanish village —

and new villas and apartments. So really, this is a bit of knitting." They walked into the forest, put in some stakes and the diggers and bulldozers moved in. "I am conservation conscious so we kept as many trees as we could," said Keith. In any case, the pines are planted commercially and are regularly chopped down for their wood and replaced, and the BBC has replanted two trees for every tree taken down on the site.

"Once cleared, the site was much steeper than we first thought so we had to do a lot of cutting and in-filling. That's why there are so many terraces—but that's good because they give more camera angles." Underneath the site is another 'village'— a huge network of miles of cable for more than 30 camera plug-in points, which means that cameras are totally mobile.

"We decided this would be a local project with the town of Coin"



complete with old town, new urbanization and a shopping plaza. And have it ready for filming in just five months.

"From the start we decided that this would be a local project with the town of Coin. So we used local labour — up to 200 craftsmen and builders working all hours to complete the work. They were amazing — nothing was too much trouble for them."

Keith started the project in 1991 with a model of what he thought was needed and then redesigned it after visiting the site in November. With a team of three assisting him, 180 detailed drawings were produced — the plans for *Eldorado*.

"I had no preconceived ideas of what a Spanish village should look like, but I knew it had to have the three basic ingredients — old town, shopping plaza The foundations were laid on January 7, 1992 and the village — complete with every shop and house having its own water and electricity supply — was ready for filming to start in mid-May. "We used to be set designers," said Keith. "With this one, we've become civil engineers!"


His previous credits include designing sets for the Miss World and Miss UK contests, the BAFTA awards, and numerous BBC-tv drama and music programmes. "I did Shackleton in Norway and Amundsen in Greenland. I usually get the cold ones!" It won't be cold in *Eldorado* this summer. The temperature can hit over 100 degrees (40°C).

Keith designed the EastEnders Albert Square backlot and studio sets and spent the last five years working with the programme at BBC Television's Elstree Centre.




Jesse Birdsall plays Marcus Tandy, a man with a past. And it's a role that suits London-born Jesse.



Eldorado has given Patch Connolly his first big television break in a 21-year career spent mostly in repertory theatre and holiday camps. And he admitted, "After all those years of touring the back of beyond, this is quite a giant lift for me."

He plays Snowy, the local village handyman who does all the little odd jobs for the local population. "He's a great observer of life. He loves to gossip, and I love him — he's a great character to play."


the 1930s back to the town, and had it performed.





Julie Fernandez won't let her disability stand in the way of her ambition to be an actress. She went to a boarding school for disabled youngsters in Hampshire and has appeared in every school play for the past six years.

"I always wanted to be an actress," she said, and her first "big break" came when she landed a part as an extra in a hospital scene at the beginning of the film Gorillas In The Mist. "But the scene was

cut," she said, "so no one saw my debut!"

Her real big break came when the school was asked if there was In fact, Julie is probably more "able" than most people, and in the serial will be spending much of her time in the urbanization swimming pool. She already identifies strongly with the character she plays.

"The part is very good — Nessa has the same sort of attitude I have," said Julie, who celebrated her 18th birthday just after arriving in Spain in May 1992.

"She is the daughter in the Lockhead family, suffering a problem father and trying to look after her problem brother, Blair (played by Josh Nathan). He's always getting into trouble, and Nessa spends her life trying to get him out of it!" Her mother Gwen is played by Patricia Brake, and her father Drew by Campbell Morrison.

"Nessa has the same sort of attitude I have" Julie was sad to leave her friends and school chums in England, but said, "I have lived away from home for six years at boarding school, so it's not too much of a wrench."


Her acting career began in Nice where she had theatre, film and TV parts before deciding to move to


"I had heard that the BBC was planning a series in the south of Spain and wanted to apply. But I



Kai's big break came when he was handed a







He was in the scouts — they hadn't thrown him out — and after appearing in a gang show was given a part in a local production of Oliver!. His building site boss saw the show and spotted Campbell as a budding actor.

"He was really great. He got the forms for me

to apply to the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama, I was given an audition and was taken on when I was 18," said Campbell.

So Campbell took two months off to be with his wife and sons Thomas, 10, and Luke, 8, spending much of the time making arrangements for them to be looked after while he was away.

Campbell plays Drew, husband of Gwen (played by Patricia Brake) and father of troublesome Blair (Josh Nathan) and wheelchair-bound daughter Nessa (Julie Fernandez). "Drew loves his daughter and dotes on her. But he can't cope with his son," explained Campbell. "Drew is married to Gwen, who is sort of upper middle class. She allows Drew to have his head — which means that every time he has a few bob in the till of his second-hand shop, he takes it out and sets off on a gambling and drinking spree."

After leaving the Royal Scottish Academy,

Campbell went to the Pitlochry Festival Theatre and on to repertory theatre in Dundee and Perth. He then took an Arts Council grant to become a trainee director and six months through his

one year stint, stepped in to take over directing a Billy Connolly play. It won a Fringe First Award, and as a result he got the job as Artistic Director of the Borderline Theatre Company.

He came to London in 1981 with a play called Rents and subsequently was asked to join the RSC. His first television role was in Educating Marmalade, a children's programme for Thames TV. His subsequent credits include Life Without George, Specials, Jeeves and Wooster, Boon, The Paradise Club, Bullman and The Bill

He left the RSC in 1989 to concentrate on film and TV work, and his film credits include *The Pope Must Die* and *Hidden City*.


Like the Lockheads, Josh's family moved to Spain


Darren Newton, who plays Gavin Hindle, was becoming very disillusioned after finding no acting work since leaving drama school in July 1991.

"June was coming down to stay with me for some peace and quiet — I live in the mountains — and Julia and Tony were doing a recce for Eldorado.

They met on the plane and June invited them for a drink in a bar where I was singing. They saw me and created the part of Trish."

Polly came from a theatrical family — her father was a comedian, her mother was a singer and impressionist and her grandfather worked with Charlie Chaplin — and Polly herself started her career when she was 15 as a Windmill girl.

Then she met her manager, and Polly made the first of many records, I Reckon You. None were huge successes, she admitted, but at the same time she started doing a lot of television work.

She was the first compere of Ready Steady Go, and appeared in Z Cars, Play for Today and many other BBC-tv productions. "I had lots of cameo roles and always played the cheerful cockney."


"I never thought my parents would agree to me coming to Spain," said Mikael. "But my dad said yes and they both thought it would be good experience — so I accepted."


Mikael will continue his studies in Spain while recording Eldorado. He plans to become a vet or go into medicine and is working on 'A' levels in biology, chemistry and maths.

She said, "I really loved it — the atmosphere, everything. I had a little dream to become famous


but I never thought it would become real. So



But her ambition is still to go back to learning, "I have qualifications to go to university and I would like to study looking after youngsters with speech


problems and Downs Syndrome children." With no time limit on a university place, she will make her decision later.


Leslee started her acting career in 1979 on

She then followed a mainly classical acting career, working at the National




