"Thousands of fans visited the set during the summer. They looked as if they were still in a state of shock. It was as if a close relative had died.

"We tried to buy the copyright to continue Eldorado in its original form but the BBC

refused to even enter into negotiations."

The old town and shopping plaza of Los Barcos, deserted since the cameras stopped rolling five months ago, will be given a complete face lift. "Viewers won't recognise the

place when we have finished with

it," said 43-year-old Dark.
"There will be the inevitable comparisons with Eldorado but

Fiesta will have much more believable characters.

"Fiesta will still be about expats but there will be less of the 'them and us' attitude.

"They will be more integrated into the Spanish way of life," said Dark, who has lived on the Costa Del Sol for two years.

He said they were confident that the new soap - planned for screening two-nights a week -would be taken up by the ITV networks.

He added: "With a purpose built set which is already paid for we reckon we can produce epi-sodes cheaper than The Bill."
